AN ACT CREATING THE "COUNCIL FOR THE BUILT ENVIRONMENT," APPROPRIATING FUNDS THEREFOR, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES

EXPLANATORY NOTE

Any country aiming to stimulate growth and development most certainly always relies on building infrastructures to encourage investors and increase government spending on infrastructures projects. Building infrastructures towards sustainable growth and development, however, does not rely on a single industry or profession alone.

A country that builds a resilient and sustainable community needs to and must rely on the collective action and competence of several professionals who work in the field of built environment, such as (i) architecture; (ii) interior design; (iii) landscape architecture; (iv) environmental planning; (v) geodetic engineering; (vi) civil engineering; (vii) electrical engineering; (viii) mechanical engineering; (ix) sanitary engineering; (x) master plumber; (xi) electronics engineering; and (xii) real estate services.

Clearly, Built Environment Professionals play a very important role in nationbuilding and development. Thus, it is necessary that we find ways to ensure that all practicing Built Environment Professionals meet the minimum requirements to safeguard the life, health, property, and welfare of the public, foster their continuing professional growth and advancement, encourage and enhance collaboration, and continually review and improve the standards of regulation, professional service, and practice. This will be best addressed by establishing a Council which shall have an administrative supervision over these Built Environment Professions.

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Accordingly, the proposed measure aims to create a Council of the Built Environment ("Council") that will exercise powers and functions pertaining to policy advisory, oversight, and collaborative platform among the different built environment professions with the primary objective of professionalizing and promoting synergy and cooperation among the built environment professions.

In view of the foregoing, passage of this bill is earnestly sought.

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Be it enacted by the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

ARTICLE I 1 **GENERAL PROVISIONS** 2 SECTION 1. Short Title. - This Act shall be known as the "Council for the Built 3 Environment Act of 2022." 4 5 SEC. 2. Statement of Policy. - The State recognizes the importance and 6 contributions of the Built Environment Professions in nation-building and development. 7 Hence, the State shall ensure that all practicing Built Environment Professional meets 8 the minimum requirements to safeguard life, health, and property, foster their 9 continuing professional growth and advancement, encourage and enhance 10 collaboration, and continually review and improve the standards of regulation, 11 professional service, and practice towards Filipino Built Environment Professionals 12 becoming socially and environmentally responsible and globally competitive. 13

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1	SEC. 3. Definition of Terms. – As used in this Act, unless the context otherwise
2	requires, the following terms shall be defined as follows:
3	a) Built Environment means the field within which the registered professionals
4	practice their profession;
5	b) Built Environment Professions means the following professions -

22	e) Professional Regulatory Laws refers to the legal framework governing the
23	practice of specific profession; the legal charter creating and governing the
24	various Boards, defining their functions and providing for the rules and
25	policies that govern the practice of a specific profession;
26	f) Accredited and Integrated Professional Organization (AIPO) refers to the
27	concerned Board and PRC Accredited Integrated Professional Organization
28	for a given profession which is specifically mandated by the provision of the
29	PRL to integrate the professionals into one national organization and where
30	membership therein by professionals is automatic and mandatory;

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1	g) Accredited Professional Organization (APO) refers to the PRC Accredited
2	Professional Organization where membership therein by professionals is
3	only voluntary;
	h) <i>CHED</i> refers to the Commission on Higher Education;
4	
5	 <i>MRA</i> refers to Mutual Recognition Agreements between or among states; <i>OPC</i> refers to the Declarate Deculation Commission.
6	 <i>PRC</i> refers to the Professional Regulation Commission; <i>REP</i> and <i>the Professional Regulation Commission</i>;
7	k) PRB refers to the Professional Regulatory Board.

10	ORGANIZATION OFMULTIPARTITE COUNCILS FOR
11	BUILT ENVIRONMENT PROFESSIONS
12	SEC 4. Creation of Multipartite Councils for the Built Environment Professions.
13	- A Multipartite Council for each of the Built Environment Professions (herein referred
14	to as "MC") is hereby created and shall be considered an attached agency to the PRC.
15	
16	SEC. 5. Objectives of the MC The objectives of the MC are as follows:
17	a) Provide a platform to discuss policy concerns in the education, internship,
18	professional regulation, and continuing professional development; and
19	b) Promote and encourage collaboration between the different stakeholders in
20	the regulation and practice of the Built Environment Professions.
21	
22	SEC. 6. Functions, Powers and Duties of the MC The MCs shall perform the
23	following functions:
24	a) Monitor local and international benchmarks in professional education,
25	internship, regulation and practice;
26	b) Study and evaluate educational innovations that shall lead to curriculum
27	development;
28	c) Regularly review the Subjects for Examination;
29	d) Develop and regularly review the Table of Specifications for the Licensure
30	Examination;

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1	e)	Develop and regularly review Internship/Guidelines in the areas such as
2		diversification of experience, duties and responsibilities of Mentors and
3		collaborative work;
4	f)	Develop and regularly review Continuing Professional Development
5		Guidelines;

7		such as Scope of Services, Schedule of Fees, and inter-professional

29	SEC.	11. Composition of Council The Council shall be composed of ex-officio
30	members	s and regular members.

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1 The ex officio members of the Council are:

- (1) Chairperson of the PRC;
- 3 (2) Chairperson of the CHED;

Chairpersons of the PRBs of all Built Environment Professions;

5 The regular members of the Council are one (1) representative from each of the 6 Multipartite Councils (non-PRB) of all Built Environment Professions.

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8 SEC. 12. *Appointment of Members of the Council*. The ex-officio members of the 9 Council, except the Chairperson of the PRC, who shall serve as Chairperson of the 10 Council, may designate their respective next-in-rank officials as permanent alternates 11 whose acts are considered as the acts of their principals.

Every regular member shall be appointed by the President from a list submitted 12 by the Chairperson of the PRC upon consultation with the other ex officio members of 13 the Council, drawn from a nomination process resulting from public consultations with 14 stakeholders engaged in each Built Environment Profession, nominating at least three 15 (3) nominees for every regular member seat: Provided, That each of the nominees is 16 not a holder of any government position and must have at least ten (10) years of 17 experience in the profession which the nominee belongs to; Provided, further, That 18 each of the nominees shall have been officially endorsed by the AIPO and the duly 19 recognized association of academics of their profession; Provided, finally, That the list 20 of nominees shall be vetted by a joint task force constituted by the Professional 21 Regulation Commission and the Commission on Higher Education representing the 22 professional and academic interests of the Filipino people, respectively. 23

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25 SEC. 13. *Removal From Office.* - The Chairperson of the Council may remove a 26 member of the Council from office on account of misconduct or inability to perform 27 his or her duties after due process.

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29 SEC. 14. *Disqualification, Vacation and Filling of Vacancies*. - A person may not be 30 appointed as a member of the Council if that person:

1	a)	Is not a Filipino citizen and resident of the Philippines;
2	b)	Has been convicted of a criminal involving moral turpitude;
3	c)	Has in terms of this Act been found guilty by the Council of improper conduct;
4		or
5	d)	Is not a registered professional as embodied in this Act.
6	An	nember of the Council must vacate his or her office if he or she -
7	a)	Becomes disqualified from being appointed as a member of the Council;
8	b)	Resigns by written notice addressed to the Chairperson;
9	c)	Has, without leave of the Council, been absent for more than two consecutive
10		meetings of the Council;
11	d)	Ceases to be permanently resident in the Philippines; or
12	e)	Is removed from office under Section 13 of this Act.
13	If a	a member of the Council dies or vacates his or her office before the expiration
14	of his o	r her term of office, the Chairperson must, within sixty (60) days from the date
15	on whi	ch the vacancy occurred, appoint the person nominated by the Council, to fill
16	the vacancy for the unexpired portion of the period for which that member was	
17	appoint	ted.
18		
19	SE	C. 15. Chairperson and Deputy Chairperson The Council shall be chaired by
20	the Cha	airperson of the PRC.
21	The	e Council shall elect a deputy chairperson among the regular members.
22	The	e regular members of the Council shall serve for a term of six (6) years, unless
2 3	sooner	separated from the service due to death, voluntary resignation, or removal for
24	cause.	In case of death, resignation, or removal for cause, their replacements shall
25	serve o	only the unexpired terms of the replaced members. Of the first set of regular
26	membe	ers, eleven (11) shall hold office for a term of three (3) years and the remaining
27	eleven	(11) for a term of six (6) years.
28	The regular members of the Council shall receive per diem every meeting in	
29	accorda	ance with existing rules and regulations.
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SEC. 16. Meetings of the Council. - The Council shall meet at least once every six 1 (6) months, or as often as necessary at the call of the Chairperson or majority of the 2 members. Members of the Council who cannot physically attend or vote at Council 3 4 meetings can participate and vote through remote communication technologies or other electronic means, such as videoconferencing, teleconferencing, or other 5 alternative modes of communication that allow them reasonable opportunities to 6 participate. A majority of the incumbent members of the Council shall constitute a 7 8 quorum to do business.

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SEC. 17. *Executive Committee.* - The Council shall have an Executive Committee consisting of a Chairperson, a Deputy Chairperson, and not more than three other members elected by the Council. The Council may appoint alternate members to the Executive Committee.

A member of the Executive Committee shall have a term of one year, and shall remain in such position until his or her successor has been elected and duly qualified; Provided that said member may be re-elected to serve as such on the Executive Committee.

18 No two members of the Executive Committee shall come from the same Built19 Environment Profession.

20 The Executive Committee must hold a meeting as and when necessary, but at 21 least four (4) times per year.

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23 SEC. 18. *Powers of the Executive Committee.* - The Executive Committee shall 24 exercise the following powers:

a) Ensure that the resolutions of the Council are carried out;

- b) Consider any matter delegated to it by the Council in terms of any law, and to
 advise the Council in connection therewith;
- c) Exercise or perform any power, duty or function delegated to it by the Council;

13	employ s	uch staff, as it may deem necessary, for the carrying out of its functions, on

15	determine	e, and may dismiss any person so appointed.
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17	SEC 2	21. Delegation of Powers The Council may, delegate any power, duty or
18	function o	conferred or imposed on it by this Act to -
19	a)	A Committee established under Section 19;
20	b)	The Executive Committee elected under section 17;
21	c)	The Chairperson of the Council or any member of the Council; or
22	d)	Any officer of the Council.

24	SEC	. 22. Reporting The Council shall furnish the Commissioner an Annual
25	Report or	the performance and exercise of the functions and affairs of the Council
26	including,	but not limited to:
27	a)	a report regarding the execution of the functions of the Council;
28	b)	a report regarding the envisaged strategies of the council; and
29	c)	such other information as the Commissioner may from time to time
30		determine.

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SEC. 23. Delineation of Scope of Work and Terms of Reference for Collaboration, 1 - The Council must, after receipt of the recommendations submitted to it by the MCs 2 in terms of the Professional Regulatory Laws -3 4 a) Determine policy with regard to the identification of work for the different Built Environment Professions; 5 b) Consult with any person, body or industry that may be affected by the 6 identification of work in terms of this Section; 7 c) Identify the scope of work for every Built Environment Profession; and 8 d) Establish terms of reference for collaboration between Built Environmental 9 Professionals, Foreign Professionals and Non-Professional creatives and 10 11 artists. 12 13 ARTICLE IV FINAL PROVISIONS 14 SEC. 24. Appropriations. - The amount necessary for the immediate 15 implementation of this Act shall be included in the annual General Appropriations Act. 16 17 SEC. 25. Implementing Rules and Regulations. - The Professional Regulation 18 Commission, the Commission on Higher Education, together with the Professional 19 Regulatory Boards and AIPOs of the Built Environment Professions are tasked to 20 prepare the Implementing Rules and Regulations (IRR) required for the 21 22 implementation of this Act. The IRR shall be promulgated within ninety (90) days upon approval of this Act. 23 24 SEC. 26. Separability Clause. - If, for any reason, any section or provisions of 25 this Act is declared unconstitutional, or invalid, the other sections and provisions, 26 which are not affected by it, shall continue to be in full force and effect. 27 28

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1 SEC. 27. *Repealing Clause.* - All laws, decrees, executive orders, agreements, 2 rules, and regulations, or parts thereof inconsistent with the provisions of this Act are 3 hereby repealed or modified accordingly.

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5 SEC. 28. *Effectivity*. This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days after is complete 6 publication in either the Official Gazette or in two (2) newspapers of general 7 circulation.
